
Let's talk Credits!


Credits looks different in different contexts.



In movies, every role is listed.
In other contexts, crediting can be more informal, selective, or even overlooked.

So the main question is...

"How do I decide if a contribution should be publicly and formally credited?"

This distinction point is called **Demarcation**, it is also called....

The "heat point"

where..

- Inspiration blurs into appropriation
- Influence shapes contribution
- Authorship becomes a power negotiation





some guidelines...

Did the person give labor or time specifically to your project?

One-time or informal help → Acknowledgment

Ongoing input → Contributor credit

Did the person contribute to the actual development or creation of the work?

Yes? → Consider formal credit (e.g., "dancer," "dramaturg," "composer," etc.).

No, but they were an influence? → Consider an acknowledgment (e.g., "This work was inspired by...").

Was their contribution essential to shaping your final idea, concept, or method?

- → If yes, that moves beyond inspiration.
- → Consider crediting them as a collaborator or contributor.

What is the power dynamic between you and the person being credited?

→can you have an open conversation with your contributors about if/ how they want to be credited?

→Some people have more knowledge, institutional power / access to funding than others, can you help bridge the gap?
